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# **APH AT-A-GLANCE**

#### Assessing the Health of Algoma

In order to properly prioritize our work in public health, we need to understand the priority concerns. To accomplish this, we need information on the health status of the population, and we need a framework to prioritize actions.

Assessing the health of an entire population is a complex task. It's not as simple as taking vital signs or ordering a test on an individual. Health data needs to be collected, appraised, and interpreted. We accomplish this through two of the six core functions of public health; surveillance and population health assessment.

Health surveillance involves collecting health information on a continuing basis. This process needs to be systematic, timely, and organized. It then needs to be analyzed and actioned in a way that can meaningfully improve health outcomes.

Population health assessment (PHA) has similar methods as surveillance, but there are key differences. The goal of surveillance is largely detection, where the goal of PHA is planning. Surveillance is ongoing, where PHA is done at longer intervals, often years at a time. This allows for more depth in the analysis where the broader determinants of health can be explored.

As mentioned in the previous report, APH is currently doing a population health assessment. Our community health profile is due for revision, and efforts are underway. To date, we have re-examined the different 'baskets' of health indicators we will need to update. The next step is internal consultation with our programs and content experts which begins March 1. This step ensures we are not simply repeating the last assessment, but are looking at new and emerging trends, incorporating key context changes, and providing data that is useful for action. Following this, we then begin the heavy lifting of collecting the data.

#### **Employee Appreciation Day**

On March 3, we will be having our annual Employee Appreciation Day. This will be a combination in-person / online event in the morning with other activities in the afternoon. We're very pleased to be able to do this partially in person after many difficult years of pandemic response. This will occur in all of our offices, and I plan to attend in Blind River for the morning and Elliot Lake for the afternoon.

#### Shadows of the Mind

In Algoma and across northern Ontario, the worsening opioid crisis remains a top concern. Algoma Public Health (APH) continues to work with partners across multiple sectors to address opioid-related harms; through treatment and harm reduction approaches, as well as prevention and community safety initiatives. An upcoming opportunity to showcase local voices and momentum regarding evidence-based interventions will occur on Saturday, February 25, at 9:00 am, where the Shadows of the Mind Film Festival will screen the documentary Love in the Time of Fentanyl. Following the screening, APH will facilitate a panel discussion. The panel will include participation from people with lived experience and service providers across the spectrum of treatment and harm reduction services, including an addiction medicine physician, Save Our Young Adults (SOYA), Maamwesying North Shore Community Health Services, Canadian Mental Health Association (CMHA), and Sault Area Hospital (SAH).

This initiative underscores the importance of local partnerships; particularly the inclusion of voices with lived experience, as we move forward together.

# **Public Health Champion(s) 2022**

Local public health in action

Let's shine a light on those who make our community healthier.

Do you know a person or an organization that is making a positive difference in our community? Is their passion rooted in helping their community live a healthier life, regardless of age, income, or socio-economic background? They may be our next Public Health Champion.

A Public Health Champion is anyone who helps to protect and promote community health and advance health equity in Algoma, whether through leading, collaborating, innovating, or fostering opportunities for *health for all, together*.

Algoma Public Health is calling on residents to nominate local citizens and organizations for the 2022 Public Health Champion Award. Help us recognize the extraordinary achievements of fellow champions for public health.

For 2022, we would like to honor 2 Public Health Champions.

A Public Health Champion might be an individual or organization that:

- Makes a difference by working with local government to make positive changes in the community.
  - For example, working with community partners to influence municipal decision making for healthier plans. This might include expanding opportunities for active transportation and outdoor recreation.
- Brings together community partners to work together to improve the overall health of the population in Algoma.
  - For example, working with partners to enhance community connection and cohesion, through social and cultural activities that bring people together to improve physical and mental well-being. This might include, a neighbourhood initiative, new volunteer group, a community engagement art project, youth mental wellness initiatives, etc.
- Empowers groups within the community and helps build equal opportunities for priority populations to attain their full health potential.
  - For example, working with priority populations to develop a shared understanding of community needs and solutions to complex issues (e.g., opioid crisis, climate change, food insecurity, poverty, housing crisis, etc.). This might include a campaign to shed light on community suffering from the opioid crisis and reduce stigma, advocacy for a living wage, creative programs to reduce plastic waste, etc.

#### Eligibility

To be eligible for nomination, an individual or organization must be a resident/organization in the Algoma district.

Current members of the board of health for Algoma Public Health and current Algoma Public Health staff are not eligible.

#### **Nomination:**

The call for nomination runs from February 7 - March 8, 2023. Nomination forms are available online or can be filled out and mailed or dropped off to Algoma Public Health.

A selection committee made up of board members, staff and the medical officer of health will review and decide on a winner based on the criteria above.

The award recipient will be publicly recognized at the Board of Health meeting scheduled for 5 p.m. on March 22, 2023.

#### **Award Selection**

Nominations are evaluated by members of the Algoma Public Health Board of Health and Algoma Public Health staff.

#### Notes to Financial Statements – December 2022

#### **Reporting Period**

The December 2022 financial reports include twelve months of financial results for Public Health. All other non-funded public health programs are reporting nine months of results from the operating year ending March 31, 2023.

#### **Statement of Operations (see page 1)**

#### Summary - Public Health and Non Public Health Programs

APH received the 2022 Amending Agreement from the province identifying the approved funding from the province for public health programs. In May 2022, the Ministry of Health had approved one-time funding to support approximately 65% of originally anticipated and estimated eligible COVID-19 extraordinary costs for the 2022 calendar year (allocating \$2.2M versus our original ask of \$3.4M). This allocation is reflected in the presented 2022 annual budget for public health programs. In January 2023, the Ministry of Health announced a second round of allocations regarding 2022 COVID-19 one-time extraordinary funds, which were based on public health unit's second quarter submissions to the Ministry – APH was allocated an additional \$1,124,600. Management has taken the conservative approach by not adjusting the 2022 budget reflected in these statements, as based on actual estimated expenditures at December 31, 2022 for public health programs, the Board of Health will no longer be eligible for these funds.

As of December 31, 2022, Public Health calendar programs are reporting a \$819K positive variance driven by a \$803K positive variance in expenditures and a \$16K positive variance in revenues.

#### Public Health Revenue (see page 2)

Overall, our Public Health revenues are on budget for 2022 (within less than 1% of budget year to date). Year to date, we have received funding payments totaling \$2.2M for our COVID programs versus total annual approval of \$2.2M (this being exclusive of additional allocation approved in January 2023). The province has confirmed that one time extraordinary cost reimbursement for the COVID 19 programs will continue through 2022 and 2023, with approval and on-going funding to be based off of our Annual Service Plan and quarterly submissions to the province. Our fourth quarter submission to the Ministry was submitted on January 31, 2023, noting total forecasted requirements for one-time extraordinary cost reimbursement for COVID 19 programs at \$1.4M.

Mitigation funding from the province will continue for the 2022-2023 and 2023-2024 calendar years.

Fiscal funding has been approved totaling \$2.2M for one time projects and initiatives. This includes \$191,700 to support the Temporary Retention Incentive for Nurses for the 2022-23 fiscal year. This funding is to support the second installment of two bonus payments which was due and paid to eligible nurses in September 2022.

No funding has been approved to date for COVID Recovery initiatives (\$650K was requested for 2022).

The COVID-19: School-Focused Nurses Initiative has been extended for the remainder of the 2022-2023 school year (i.e. through June 2023).

#### Public Health Expenses (see page 3)

#### Salary, Wages & Benefits

There is a \$1,070K positive variance associated with salary, wages & benefits driven by ongoing position vacancies. Recruitment efforts are ongoing.

#### Travel

There is a \$51K positive variance associated with travel expenses. This is a result of APH employees working virtually as opposed to travelling throughout the district or attending meetings outside of the district for the greater part of the current calendar year. We are starting to see this gap close as staff begin travelling throughout the district again to support regular program work.

#### **Programs**

There is a \$57K negative variance associated with programs. Our spending gap with respect to programs has closed based on initiatives taken to plan for recovery of programs including identified program materials and supplies, as well as staff and leadership development initiatives.

#### **Computer Services**

There is a \$80K negative variance associated with computer services. This is driven by identified needs associated with our staff returning to the workplace – including conference room upgrades and miscellaneous computer equipment.

#### **Program Promotion**

There is a \$19K positive variance associated with program promotion as reduced spend on media and promotion has been realized while we work through our COVID recovery plan and work to develop plans to get our regular mandatory programming back to normal operational levels.

#### **Professional Development**

There is a \$11K positive variance for professional development as for the majority of the year, there has been limited staff availability and lack of opportunity. Professional development will be a focus for 2023 as we work to re-build our workforce centered on recovery of mandatory public health programs.

#### Facilities Expense

There is a \$166K negative variance associated with facilities expenses which is driven by increased security and janitorial requirements associated with COVID 19 response and increasing utility & lease costs year to date. Needs for increased security and janitorial continues to be regularly assessed as we enter into the recovery phase of the COVID 19 pandemic and, for the most part, have returned to prepandemic levels. Also noteable that the general rates for security services district wide have drastically increased over the course of the pandemic due to lack of supply/availability and, in some cases, the need for guards to travel in order to attend posts.

#### Fees and Insurance

There is a \$31K negative variance associated with fees and insurance due to increasing insurance premiums and the requirement to add a cyber risk policy.

#### **COVID-19 Expenses**

#### **COVID-19 Response**

This program includes case and contact management as well as supporting the information phone lines. December year to date expenses were \$2,006K (versus \$5,134K this time last year). The majority of this consists of salaries and benefits costs of APH staff that under normal circumstances would be working in their assigned public health programs.

#### **COVID-19 Mass Immunization**

This program includes the planning, support, documentation, and actual needles in arms of the various COVID-19 vaccines. December year to date expenses were \$1,151K (versus \$4,071K this time last year).

#### Financial Position - Balance Sheet (see page 7)

APH's liquidity position continues to be stable and the bank has been reconciled as of December 31, 2022. Cash includes \$2.0M in short-term investments.

Long-term debt of \$4.1 million is held by TD Bank @ 1.80% for a 60-month term (amortization period of 120 months) and matures on September 1, 2026. \$239k of the loan relates to the financing of the Elliot Lake office renovations, which occurred in 2015 with the balance, related to the financing of the 294 Willow Avenue facility located in Sault Ste. Marie. There are no material accounts receivable collection concerns.

#### Re: Boards of Health - Order in Council Appointments

On behalf of the Boards of Health Section of the Association of Local Public Health Agencies (alPHa), we are writing to you with regards to delays in Order-in-Council appointments to local boards of health under Section 49 of the *Health Protection and Promotion Act*.

Ontario's boards of health are at the forefront of the important decisions that are aimed at keeping people healthy throughout the province, and their success depends on stability and consistency within their membership. This is especially important in the immediate aftermath of municipal elections, which already have a significant destabilizing effect every four years.

24 out of 34 Ontario Boards of Health depend on provincial appointees to maintain their necessary complement, and the delays they are already reporting in securing these appointments are having a detrimental effect on their governance and accountability roles, as well as their engagements with their respective public health units, local councils, and community partners.

This is not the first time we have been faced with this issue, which we also raised with you via <u>correspondence</u> in June of 2020. At that time, several boards reported that their requests for appointments were not responded to, not approved, or approved for only a limited time. The uncertainty, interruption of continuity and simple depletion of the ranks compromised the capacity for sound decision-making on local public health matters in many areas, and we worry that this is being repeated.

On January 25, 2023, at a regular meeting of the Board for the Timiskaming Health Unit, the Board received a <u>Briefing Note 'Mandatory Labels on Alcohol Containers</u> and passed the following motion:

#### Motion (#6R-2023) was passed which included the following:

**BE IT RESOLVED** that the Board of Health resolve to Call on the Government of Canada to amend the Food and Drug Act to make mandatory that all alcohol beverage containers have enhanced alcohol labels affixed:

- 1. Indicating what constitutes a standard drink;
- 2. Illustrating the number of standard drinks in the beverage container; and
- 3. Displaying health messages regarding adverse health outcomes, including the cancer risks associated with the consumption of alcohol.

**AND FURTHER THAT**, the THU Board of Health endorse, in principle, Bill S254 – An Act to Amend the Food and Drug Act (Warning Labels on Alcoholic Beverages) and Motion M-61 A National Warning Label Strategy for Alcoholic Products.

The Timiskaming Health Unit fully supports the above recommendation, and thanks you for your consideration.



## **RRFSS Update**



There are still two more opportunities to join RRFSS this year and the next cycle of data collection starts in May. Data collection is available for 2023 in a variety of modes: telephone (dual-frame landline and cell phone samples) and online (panel and convenience samples). Costs vary by data collection method, number of completed interviews and survey length. For example, 720 completed telephone interviews (50 percent landline/50 percent cell) with ten minutes of interview questions would cost approximately \$35,000. A panel sample with 600 completed interviews and a tenminute survey would cost approximately \$20,000. RRFSS also allows for custom surveys based on specific budgets.
