Who We Are:

The Algoma Youth Action Alliance is a youth-led, adult-supported coalition with four committees across the district interested in promoting healthy lifestyles, in particular being tobacco-free to youth and the community.



What do committee reps do?

Once a month, committee reps get together after school to plan events and address health promotion issues focusing on tobacco prevention. In doing so, youth gain valuable skills that can be used in the future and help to make a difference in their community.

Some great events AYAA Committees have organized:

Schools Without Borders Sault Ste. Marie

Schools Without Borders partnered with the Canadian Cancer Society and developed a Smoke Free Movies campaign to get on-screen tobacco use and images out of youth rated films. Activities included presentations to youth, poster contest, and Galaxy theatre ads.



Teens in Motion Wawa

Teens in Motion organized a Smoke Free Movies movie night to demonstrate how the tobacco industry uses movies to promote their harmful products.

As a result of youth campaign efforts in Sault Ste Marie and Wawa, Algoma Public Health Board of Health passed a resolution to support provincial Smoke Free Movies call to action.

Teens in Motion partnered with the Lion's Club to create an inviting space at the local Lion's Club for youth to hold their meetings, trainings and events.

Teens in Action youth reps developed an interactive "Think it Thru" display and video to use as part of presentations. Think it Thru is about youth thinking for themselves and making decisions in risky situations that are right for them personally.



S.T.E.A.L.T.H. Blind River

S.T.E.A.L.T.H youth reps voiced their support for a local Smoke Free Parks and Recreational Areas bylaw at a Blind River Town Council meeting. The bylaw was passed January 17, 2011. Youth reps demonstrated their support by educating the public about the bylaw.
